Michael Damelio and I found a cluster of morels, new members Beth Toulon & Bill Leake found over 2 dozen, the rest of the group found a couple here & there. Joanne Williams had a little run-in with a giant snake (I was not there to witness - but heard the commotion).

Thankfully no one was hurt.

2nd & 3rd site were much less fruitful in terms of morels, with only Lucas Lamka finding a morel, and Lerad Nilles and Tom Abbot finding some oyster mushrooms (most likely P. populinus). It started raining around noon so we hunkered down for a little bit and had lunch in our respective cars. The last site we visited yielded some unique mushrooms.

The official foray ended around 2pm, but a majority of us wound up at the first site and chatted a little while before disbanding. Michael and I stayed back to explore the other side of the creek where we found a lot of Coprophilous fungi and some dried out oysters on dead cottonwood.


Mushrooms found overall: Morchella esculenta, Pleurotus populinus (sp?), Panaeolus semiovatus, Agrocybe praecox, Coprinopsis sp., Panaeolus foensecii, Stropharia semiglobata, Verpa conica, Polyporus auricularia
